Relation to curriculum	This course is a compulsory subject in the first year/first semester. This course is the basis for studying cities because it discusses how cities develop over time, and what factors influence the development of a city in each period.
Type of teaching	1. Interactive lecture is carried out at the first meeting (week 1 – 7) and each group presents the results of their group discussion; 2. Small Group Discussion is conducted at the second meeting until the fifteenth meeting (week 9 – 15) except during the midterm exam (week 8). Small Group Discussion are used when discussing the history of urban development from time to time.
Workload	This course consists of 3 credits in one meeting/ week (1 credit consists of 50 minutes of face-to-face, 60 minutes of assignments/tutorials, and 60 minutes of self-study).
